Written update provided

R. Dumas, Corporate Officer attended on behalf of A. Ferguson, Staff Liaison, North Saanich. The Committee discussed the written update provided and noted the communication board installed in Colwood's park as a great initiative and their desire to see these in more places with greater attention to height limitations at the time on installation.

R. Dumas noted the upcoming Local General Election and informed the Committee that North Saanich is implementing the following accessible options:

- Accessible voting booth at a reduced height to provide a more user friendly experience.
- Family voting booth for those with children or those requiring some more space.
- Mail-in ballots to allow residents another option for casting their votes.

The Committee asked how someone could obtain assistance in the voting place if needed. R. Dumas explained that people may bring someone to help them, or the Chief Election Officer, Deputy Chief Election Officer, or Presiding Officer can assist them.

- The parking lot by the Cameo building was recently repaved and the spots were painted in accordance with the Town's parking bylaw.

The Committee asked about the number of accessible parking spots in Sidney versus the number of issued parking permits. The Committee noted these numbers are available through suppliers of the permits. The Committee also expressed an interest in assisting with the study from a lived experience point of view. Though a parking spot may be labelled "accessible" they are not always.

The Committee noted that Central Saanich and Sidney are also at various stages in the same process and expressed an interest in seeing the draft OCP when it is ready. They also commented that accessibility is a theme throughout the other two OCP's and would like to see North Saanich's follow suit.

- Central Saanich is reviewing their process by which correspondence is received. This process has paused for the moment, but is a priority for staff and Council.
- Advance voting opportunities are going to take place on October 5th and October 12th.

**d)**            Verbal Update - Sidney - Councillor O'Keeffe

Councillor O'Keeffe provided an update and noted the following:

- OCP revision process has been completed and has many references to accessibility. The Town is looking forward to more development within the housing policies.
- Sidney requires developers to provide 20% of their units as "adaptable housing" in multi-family buildings. Though these units are needed in the community, there is no mechanism or process in place to connect those who need an adaptable unit with these finished suites as they become available.
- Recently attended a webinar hosted by an organization called "The Right Fit" that match people with a need for an adaptable living space with those who are building them. They are looking to expand their program on Vancouver Island and are interested in the CRD area.
- Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction is interested in coming to the Island on September 22, 2022 and there will be invitations coming to the municipalities.

The Committee discussed “The Right Fit” initiative including a desire for adaptable units to be marketed in such a way that attracts more purchasers requiring accessible living.

R. Roy, Town of Sidney provided some insight into the adaptable units policy noting the following:

- Building plans and permits have the adaptable units identified and this information is retained by the Town.
- A detailed listing of these units is not readily available, though could be made by staff.

## **8 ROUNDTABLE UPDATES**

The Chair opened the floor for members to provide comments and the following items were discussed:

- Thanks to Panorama Recreation Centre for their accessible washrooms and changerooms allowing everyone to participate and feel welcome in their facility.
- Members attending meetings with the White Cane Club brought forward a need for a sidewalk down Mount Newton Cross Road in Central Saanich from the recently completed bus stop to the intersection of Wallace Drive and East Saanich Road. Councillor Newton noted that a multi-use path is on the radar for the Central Saanich Council and has been identified as a top priority.
- Disappointment with local taxi companies was discussed as many people rely on taxi's and it can be quite difficult for folks who need a ride somewhere to get the assistance they need. Members noted that short rides are difficult and expressed safety concerns when being left without a ride.
- Curbs are continually identified as an issue within the Peninsula communities.
- A mechanism/process by which members of the public can report issues directly to the Committee. R. Dumas, Corporate Officer, North Saanich noted that the Council members on the Committee can put forward a Notice of Motion to their respective Councils to be discussed at an upcoming meeting. Council Liaison reports were listed as another means of sharing information with the rest of Council and as a starting point for directing staff to take action.
- Panorama Recreation Centre has received an accessibility grant allowing for many improvements throughout the facility. Accessible toilets, sinks, and faucets will be installed as well as grab bars, automatic doors, and new signage. These amenities will be going in the rink and arena area and are to be completed in October 2022.
- Greenglade Community Centre is also receiving some valuable upgrades. The play structure is going to be revised to allow for inclusive play.
- Panorama Recreation Centre will be needing some input from the Committee regarding accessible upgrades needed to the arena and changerooms.
- The process to bring forward items for the agenda. The Recording Secretary will do a call for agenda items prior to the agenda publishing and items can be sent in for review by the Chair prior to appearing on an agenda.
- Disability Alliance of BC and the Province are potentially having a conference in November, and they are looking for input from those who have successfully set up an Accessibility Committee under the legislation.
- Needs for accessible options are not something you can switch on and off. Accessible washrooms being out of service and options not being provided does not help folks who need different accommodations.
- Outside Play Day in Nanaimo was well attended and there were many innovative pieces of equipment available for people to try out. A local business also provided a massage table as a changing table for those who need a safe space to change. Members noted this was a first-time experience for them and made the day of family fun even easier.

- Preference for a small group to come forward with a template that the Committee can review together as well as form the base of an Accessibility Plan.
- Circulating the draft plan between the Committee & Council, as well as staff and receiving input from the public.

**Accessibility Plan for Saanich Peninsula Municipalities – Notes for Discussion  
Sept 22, 2022.**

**BACKGROUND**

**Accessibility Plan**

Part 3 of the Accessible B.C. Act requires government and prescribed organizations to have the following:

- An accessibility committee
- An accessibility plan
- A mechanism for feedback on accessibility.

**Requirements for an accessibility plan**

- Outline how the organization will identify, remove and prevent barriers to people in the organization or those interacting with it.
- Must consult with it's accessibility committee in develop and updating of the plan
- The plan must be made available to the public.
- The plan must be reviewed and updated at least once every three years.
- In updating their plan, organizations must also consider comments received through its public feedback mechanism.
- Must report annually on progress.

**Considerations for Saanich Peninsula municipalities:**

- There is one general plan that identifies broad goals and strategies.
- Each municipality prepares an "Action Plan" to address the goals/strategies, specific to their communities.
- Municipalities are encouraged to collaborate/exchange information and resources during implementation.
- Each municipality reports on progress of their Action Plan, which is rolled into Annual Report for the regional plan.
- Reporting out to public and consultation for feedback could take place during National Accessibility Week (early June)

**b) Feedback Mechanisms - Referred by Councillor O'Keeffe**

The Committee discussed feedback mechanisms for members of the public to report and identify issues within the community. The following was noted during the discussion:

- Being a tri-municipal committee presents a challenge for the public and members to get concerns addressed in a timely manner.
- Elected officials make a good first point of contact for the public and staff can assist by getting correspondence on a Council agenda or handed over to a department for information and follow up.
- Committee would like to see information only copies of the accessibility requests, complaints and issues identified by the public.
